Skippers and Crew Needed for September Regattas

CRUISERS

Skippers and Crew are needed to sail the SCOW cruisers in the 2005 Leukemia Cup on Saturday September 10th. This is an annual race to raise money for the local Leukemia and Lymphoma Society. Members are encouraged to form fund-raising teams and solicit donations from friends, co-workers, family, and other SCOW members. This is a SCOW sponsored event which means that you can raise money at SCOW meetings and events such as Social Sails. However, SCOW policy does not allow use of the "all-SCOW" e-mail list to solicit donations.

The boats are reserved and will be assigned to the skipper and team that raise the largest amount of money for the Leukemia Society. Teams must have a racing-qualified cruiser skipper for the boat during the race. The skipper and team that raise the most donations will get first choice of boats for the Leukemia Cup. Fund raising can continue until Thursday, September 8. At the Social Sail on that date, we will announce the fund raising results and will allow the winning team to select their preferred boat. FLYING SCOTTS

Skippers and Crew are also needed to race the Flying Scotts in the Leukemia Cup. In addition to winning the right to race a Flying Scott in the September 10, 2005 regatta, fund raisers can also race in the President's Cup held on the Potomac River on Sunday, September 11th.

Like the cruisers, teams that raise the most donations get to choose their boats for the regattas. It is not necessary to be a racing qualified skipper to race the Flying Scotts. If you want to raise funds and compete for a boat in the Leukemia Cup and President's Cup, information on race procedures will be available at the Tuesday Night Flying Scott Races, as well as on weekends.

DO:

- Read the newsletter, to become familiar with procedures and guidelines for article submission.

By following our suggested guidelines, you will find that there is less turn-over in newsletter production volunteers, and you might find a better newsletter. Remember, we are volunteers who put the newsletter together *in our spare time*. The less energy we have to spend on defending innocent mistakes, the more we have to create the newsletter you desire. A little appreciation goes a long way.

Keys to Article Submission

1. When you e-mail the article, entitle it: **article submission**
2. When you submit photos for the newsletter, always include the names of people in each photo.
3. Submit your article by the **15th of the month**
4. Submit a full, written-out article
5. Submit your articles to ChaNNels@scow.org

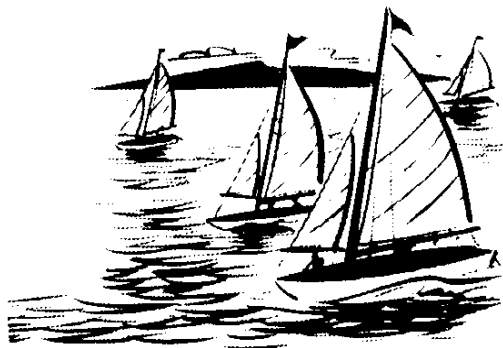

A bunch of SCOW members ventured out on the Rhode River this weekend aboard Odyssey and Jenny Kamm's boat for a day sail. Despite threatening skies to the east and some pretty good wind gusts, we managed to anchor for lunch in the upper reaches of the river just ahead of a little rain. After some visiting and good food, we went out for a couple hours sailing, and a good time was had by all.

The next Bay event will be the Labor Day Cruise: The first night, I thought we would have different anchorages for the Lower Bay and Upper Bay fleets, reducing the distance each has to go that day. Upper Bay boats will anchor in Shaw Bay, in the Wye River, off Eastern Bay. Lower Bay boats will anchor behind Casson Point, a short way up Hudson Creek, off the Little Choptank River. On the second night, we will all meet in Dunn Cove, Harris Creek, off the Choptank River.
